## LARA CASTEL AT GYA CONSULTORES<sup>1</sup>

Lara could not take anymore. It was early March and for several weeks she had been feeling a deep sense of distress. Although only two months had passed since she joined her new company, a Human Resources consultancy firm in Badajoz<sup>2</sup>, she had a strong feeling it was not the job she wanted to do.
